



Differences Between Gloss Levels

Matt Finishes

Flat Finish (no sheen)

Faster drying

Does not reflect light

Hides imperfections and surface defects in timber

Can be difficult to keep clean

Suitable for rooms that receive little traffic such as studies

Satin Finishes

Also known as a velvet finish

Most recommended finish

Easy to clean with a light wipe

Use in rooms such as bedrooms, hallways and living areas

Suitable for coating window frames, doors trims and wooden ceilings.

Semi-Gloss Finishes

Significant shine without be overly overt

Easier to clean than matt and satin - will withstand frequent cleaning and water

Reflective nature of coating will highlight imperfections if timber is not thoroughly prepared prior to coating

Suitable for bathroom and kitchen doors, windows and trims

Gloss Finishes

Highest reflective quality

Will highlight the smallest imperfections if timber not meticulously prepared

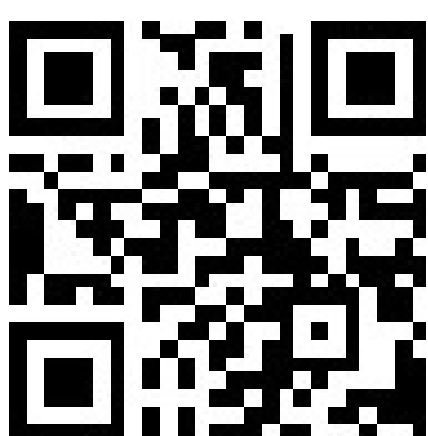
Can be quite shiny, especially if direct light hits the surface

The easiest surface to keep clean and maintain

The end grain of timber shown best in this coating

Use on windows, doors, trims and furniture for durable finish
